### **Hawaiian Tropic Zone**

Planet Hollywood, 3667 S. Las Vegas Blvd. You're probably starting to feel pretty good about now and Hawaiian Tropic Zone is going to help you out even more. Keep an eye out for staff in floral sarongs and bikini tops and women in the patio's hot tub. (The food menu here is by David Burke, so if you're hungry-eat.)

Bellagio, 3600 S. Las Vegas Blvd.

Time to reel yourself back in. Caramel is too sophisticated to want to deal with your fraternity house antics, so this is a good time to chill out and actually enjoy what you're drinking. Plus, the crowd's always attractive, but no one's going to talk to you if you're acting like an idiot.

Minus 5

Mandalay Bay, 3930 S. Las Vegas Blvd.

After throwing back a few surrounded by women in bathing suits, you'll probably want to cool off and even if you don't, the dudes in your group might. Luckily, Minus 5 is a bar made from ice. You'll have to throw on a parka (provided there), but it's worth it and the cold (minus 5 Celsius, appropriately) will help energize you for the rest of the journey.

Monte Carlo, 3770 S. Las Vegas Blvd.

You're coming down the homestretch here and might be getting blearyeyed, but you won't miss Diablo's Cantina because there's a giant shedevil out in front. Find her, go inside for a drink. (If your wallet's getting light, check for drink specials, too – they usually have some great ones.)





Excalibur, 3850 S. Las Vegas Blvd.

You've probably had enough to drink now that no one's feelings are going to get hurt at Dick's, but that doesn't mean the staff isn't going to try. Expect members of your group to leave Dick's wearing hilarious hats after having taken pictures they won't remember in the morning. Bonus: you can also eat (again) here. This is recommended.

Luxor, 3900 S. Las Vegas Blvd.

You've probably been in some big bar crowds by now and might not feel like you're getting the respect you deserve. Noir Bar will change that when you're spirited inside through a speakeasy-like entrance into a bar "hidden" inside the Luxor.

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
